

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Note from the curator

Thank you to Northern Manhattan Arts Alliance for inviting me to jury their first online exhibition in reposense to the Covd19 Pandemic. And thank you to the artists of Washington Heights, Inwood, and El Barrio for presenting their works.

Art Centers are the heart and soul of local art communities- and NOMAA is clearly an epicenter for upper Manhattan. Arts organizations are lively ecosystems; they support artists in building a sustainable studio practice, offer spaces to work, tools and resources for creation, and opportunities to exhibit. They create community for artists and art lovers in their own locale. They embody the importance of art to every aspect of a civilized society.

Viewing the large selection of work I was impressed by the enormous passion and talent of the upper Manhattan art community. Jurying is a challenging process - your mandate is to choose only some of the wonderful works. As an artist myself, I find the process exhilarating – seeing so much original work all at once – and incredibly difficult – choosing only some. The first criterion is to view each artwork as autonomous, expressing the vision of the artist. Many factors come into play: strength of concept, quality of execution, poetic or unusual use of materials, and that mysterious factor of all art — the inventiveness that enlivens the work and gives it a unique voice.

The next step in choosing is how the space, even a virtual one, will hold the entirety of artworks. Most importantly in an exhibition, how the individual works will simultaneously maintain their autonomy and through juxtaposition to other works reveal new meaning. The exhibition itself becomes an additional artwork, with its own form, character, and logic. We move through the images like a dance, we experience work in multiple dimensions, individually, in sequence, in groupings, in relationship, our memory, our conversation.

The strong quality and diversity of the work was inspiring, from quiet observational naturalism to bold gestural abstraction, from poetic interpretation to wry humor. All genres inspire me, so I pulled works to create collections for the three galleries that spoke to one another and to the themes of Community, Connection, and Reflection. Listening to the artworks, they began to create families, grouping themselves through color, mood, subject, and the indefinable associations that come about through the coincidence of works. The exhibition has different spaces, atmospheres, tempos; intimate areas and bolder ones, quiet spaces and jazzy ones. Surprising associations appear both within a local grouping and across the whole. I encourage viewers to move through the three galleries to experience the artworks both individually and as a body of works, a family of art in lively dialogue, with itself, the other works, and with the community.

Artists are a brave bunch. What a privilege to see the many dedicated artists thriving here - and to experience this active supportive community! My sincerest thanks and compliments to all those who participated and assisted in the process; we are a lucky community of artists. Congratulations to every artist who entered, and to those whose work was chosen for this exhibition.

This gallery explores work that offers solace and contemplation in a challenging time.
































